Our goal is to finish construction as soon as possible, but our progress will depend on the participation of all of the Galway Lions in this great project.

Despite some nasty weather, a delay in getting a building permit, and other factors, work started on the 28th of August, 2009. On October 3rd, several local carpenters (at the urging of Lion Ed Pike) showed up to frame and sheathe the addition to our building. Coffee and doughnuts were available early, followed by delicious chili, provided by **Galway Lions and Lioness** members. Lions president Neila Nowicki worked diligently (and served the chili!!)





Treasurer's Report

Greetings fellow Lions. This is the first installment of a regular column I plan to write for our newsletter. My goal is to keep you informed as to the state of the Club's finances and our efforts to help the members of our community. You all work hard at our various fundraisers and I'm sure you would be interested in knowing where the money goes.

The majority of our spending is planned in the budget and recurs year after year. There are many other opportunities that arise during the year to help people in our community, and the decisions to do so are made at the Board of Directors meetings. I will report these to you as well. I will also report on any major donations we receive.

Since our year began on July 1st, several things have happened that impact the Club's finances. The first of course is the budget for the upcoming year which we formulated and passed in July. Thanks to Finance Committee Chairman Lion Jack Womer and the other members of the committee for their hard work. At the urging of Lion Ed Pike, himself a former Treasurer, we added the Walkathon to the budget for the first time. This should improve accountability and transparency. The Walkathon, which was held on September 19th, has to date resulted in \$11,678 in donations which will allow us to donate approximately \$3,600 to each of the three charities chosen this year to receive the money. I will report the exact amounts when we pay our expenses and actually distribute the money.

We received the initial \$10,000 payment from a grant from the Dockstader Trust for our Lions Building addition which has been spent and we are currently seeking our second \$10,000 installment.

To date we have spent \$275 to aid our community. \$200 was given to the Galway Junior Rifle Club and \$75 to the Galway Youth Commission Summer recreation program. As the year progresses, this type of spending will increase dramatically and I will report it to you as it occurs.

Extension: Change the outcome of someone's life.

I'd like to thank everyone for the kind words after the meeting about my message and the continued support I receive from the club as the Zone Chairman. I know that I asked for this club to take on a task that is very in-depth, and I hope that the board of directors will favorably review my request. I was thinking about Greenfield Lions Club last night when something hit me. Our District Governor is from Greenfield. If we had never extended to that area, our DG may not even be a Lion today. This year our District Governor is focusing on a few different things, but one of his new projects is a diabetes education project for the schools. It's a program that allows teachers to frame it as a lesson for the children, and it also has children with diabetes talk to their peers and explain what it's like to live with it, rather than an adult telling them too much sugar and candy is bad. After the initial program goes through a few schools being tested, we'll all be able to sell this program to the community. We would have never had this program come to the area had it not been for DG Ed being a Lion. By extending to Greenfield, we not only changed the outcome of DG Ed's life, we very well may have put in motion an idea that will change the outcome of thousands of children's lives.

Even our very own Lion Phil transferred from there, and I like to think he's a great asset to our club. None of this would have happened had we not put in the effort to open a club in Greenfield in the first place.

I understand that I've spent most of my time explaining why we should start a new club, but the next logical question for the membership is, "How do we do it?" The first thing we need to do is find a viable community that doesn't receive the services of a Lions Club which we can then discuss with the board to make a selection. From there we're going to need to come up with our extension team, specifically our recruiting teams that will go to the local businesses and community leaders to get charter members. This is why I asked the Galway Lions Club to do this. We have the manpower to put together the required teams to make extension possible. Whatever community we decide to go into we need to realize that we must have 20 charter members to start a club. As part of a recruiting team you'll be a huge part of the success of starting a new club.

Starting a new club will be fun for us. We will be able to have a feeling of great satisfaction at the result of a new club forming in our district. When we hear about the things the new club did for the families, individuals, and organizations in their community, we'll be able to look at the club with pride knowing it was a direct result of our actions.

I know we're capable of forming a new club, and I am personally excited about the prospects of success our club will have when we do it. I hope you are too!
