Plans for a new library for the greater Galway community have been announced. Galway Public Library will hold a public referendum for the purpose of bonding the library's new building project on September 22, 2015 from 10:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. The amount of the bond to be voted on is \$1.800,000. The current 1800-square-foot library is no longer adequate for providing necessary services to the Galway community. Located on land owned by the library on East Street in Galway, the new building will be 7,500 square feet, with a total public/private partnership project cost of \$3,142,000. The anticipated date for groundbreaking is late spring 2016, with completion anticipated by summer 2017.

The library is hosting a free, family-oriented event on Sunday, August 23 from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m. on the East Street building site to introduce the community to the proposed new library. The footprint of the building will be staked out, special children's activities are planned for the day, and the event includes performances beginning at 3:00 by Dan Berggren and Joe Bruchac. All are invited for a day of fun at our new library site!

From Leslie R. Klein, Galway Village Police Chief, in response to the article in the July 1 issue of "Galway Get Together" by M C Perez :

First, I question why this venue was used. Present at the Board meeting, were seven town officials, if my count is correct, and nine residents which included the two Village Officers. Total count of 16, I guess you could say it was packed. The Village Police respond to all citizens of the Village, including business owners. When we receive calls with concerns for the rate of speed of vehicles passing through the Village, we respond, and we respond by enforcing those laws that we were sworn to uphold and enforce, and take the necessary measures needed to keep our community safe. Our intent is certainly not to stop people from visiting or passing through our Town or Village. A Stewart's Store South of the Village, and one at the Northern end of the Town, might have something to do why travelers pass through the Vllage. A new restaurant might make a difference also. As a resident of Galway for over 50 years, I have always heard from residents and nonresidents alike, to be careful going through Galway or you will get a ticket. And that was before I was hired by the Village. One resident painted the side of his house with "Warning. Cop lives next door.". This is nothing new, many people still pass through the Town and the Village, most of them are doing just that, passing through. The fact, as Supervisor Lent, stated, that Galway has the lowest crime rate in the county, tells me that the State Police, County Sheriff, and the Village Police are doing what they have sworn to do. We, the Galway Village Police Department, have initiated what I call a "Damage Control Program" by limiting the hours officers are on patrol, and limiting the number of tickets issued. We will, however, continue to stop those that choose to speed, to preserve the safety of those living in Galway, and those "passing through." Shouldn't that be everyone's concern?
